This year marks the 15th year the East Side Learning Center has been a major force in **unlocking each child's** potential through the foundation of reading. We celebrate tutoring more than 2,100 children, but more importantly, we celebrate their reading success and the impact that reading has made on their lives. Our initial students are now young adults making **their way in today's** workforce and beginning families of their own.

One such person is Danzel. Recently, at Aldi, a handsome young man approached me asking if I remembered him. When he told me his name, I could see in his caring eyes that,

indeed, I did! He benefited from our tutoring in the third and fourth grades. Danzel eagerly told me he was recently married and, as a proud father, he introduced me to his darling baby girl. He also proudly shared that he is working at Wells Fargo while pursuing a post-secondary degree!

The seeds of a program to help students like Denzel were sown in 1998. The East Side Neighborhood Development Company was working on a long-range effort to revitalize the East Side of St. Paul. They saw education as a key ingredient for success and approached the School Sisters of Notre Dame about helping to address unmet educational needs in the area.

The Sisters responded and in 2001 the East Side Learning Center began to provide one-on-one tutoring in reading for struggling readers (K-3). Our pi-

lot program at John A. Johnson Achievement Plus Elementary began with 25 volunteers, School Sisters of Notre Dame, and 19 children. Since then, we have expanded to multiple sites and added a Summer Literacy Camp. The demand for tutoring continues to grow. This school year we are tutoring 300 children daily and we have a new pilot site of 20 kindergartners at Bruce Vento Elementary.

CAMPING WITHOUT MOSQUITOES

This summer 103 children (87 K and 16 Pre-k) benefitted from two Summer Literacy Camps sponsored by the East Side Learning Center. The camps were held at John A. Johnson Achievement Plus and **Community of Peace Academy**. Each “camper” received **50 minutes of one-on-one** reading instruction, 5 days a week. Plus, with the themes of Farmers Feed the World or Bugs, Books, and Butterflies they rotated to other literacy enrichment activities using poetry, music, art, and math—all requiring no insect repellent!

Forty-three community volunteer tutors generously invested more than 900 hours empowering our children to become successful readers. In-kind services provided by our summer volunteers equaled \$24, 578! The camp received support from the St. Paul Public School District and a grant from Cities 97 helped fund personnel costs associated with the literacy camps. A grant from Dollar General provided **instructional materials and books which enabled each “camper” to receive five free books for their home** libraries. Joining together, these community volunteers and funders expanded their reach. They made it possible for 94% (82 of 87) kindergartners to not only retain their reading skills, but to improve them for greater reading success in fall. In addition, 16 Pre-K children increased their knowledge of letter names and sounds.

Thank you to our volunteers, donors, and our host schools for making our 2015 Summer Literacy Camps a success!

MAKING CONNECTIONS – HOPE ACADEMY

Hmong Open Partnerships in Education (HOPE) Community Academy serves urban students in grades K-8. Located in the former **Hamm's Brewery office building**, this charter school seeks to educate all students to the highest levels of academic and social standards with a focus on Hmong language and culture. **Approximately 88% of HOPE's 450 students are English Language Learners (ELL).**

HOPE Director, Maychy Vu, knows that mastering reading fundamentals is essential in preparing students to become life-long learners. **With the majority of HOPE's students reading below their grade level**, she saw a partnership with ESLC as a way to provide much needed individualized support for struggling students. Vu provided dedicated tutoring space and worked with ESLC to develop a school day tutoring schedule that avoided after-school transportation conflicts.

With ESLC tutoring at HOPE beginning its 5th year, Vu says she was always confident that students would benefit from the program. She has come to deeply appreciate ESLC staff and tutors and was surprised by **ESLC's flexibility**. "ESLC has gone out of its way to make modifications to its program to better meet the needs of the ELL student who has a different

life experience, culture base and numerous language challenges. From lesson plans to tutor guides, ESLC does everything it can to make tutoring relevant to each **individual student.**"

ESLC Site Coordinator Rebecca Nordstrom says that this relevancy Vu **refers to is really about "making connections."** She tells of a boy who **struggled with reading**. "He was frustrated and not cooperative. In getting to know him, we found out he liked Pokemon. I found a Pokemon book to use at his next tutoring session. All of a sudden he took off. He was able to relate what he was reading to his trading cards. Not only was he reading but his attitude changed **overnight.**"

In addition to making connections with students, both Nordstrom and Vu emphasize the value of connecting ESLC and HOPE resources to provide a team approach to reading. HOPE administration, teachers, reading specialists and ESLC are located in close proximity to one another. Nordstrom says, **"We are able to connect on a daily basis, form relationships and reinforce each other's efforts. We are all in it together and focused on what is best for the children."**

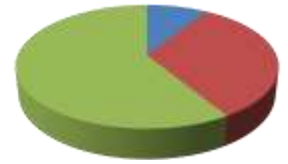

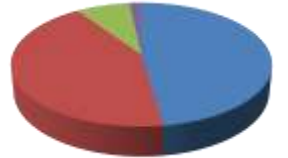

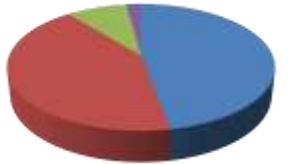

During the 2013-14 school year, ESLC tutored 22 kindergartners identified by HOPE staff as needing additional reading assistance. Only one child returned to ESLC tutoring the following school year as a first grader. **HOPE's** commitment to reading fundamentals, summer school and **ESLC's tutoring program** all contributed to this success story.

ESLC's success at HOPE goes beyond the achievements described above. It can be measured in the number of hugs given to ESLC staff and tutors when they walk through the lunchroom. It can be heard in

the voices of children who want to be in ESLC tutoring because their **friends say it is "cool."** It can be seen in the America Reads Award to ESLC at HOPE Academy which hangs on the wall. ESLC is successfully connecting to the culture and value system created at HOPE.

Asked about the future, Nordstrom and Vu both agree that being able to shift reading resources from intervention to prevention is their goal. Achieving reading competency at an early age minimizes the need to intervene later. Getting to the point where reading support resources are focused on kindergartners rather than older

students will be a true measure of a successful connection for everyone.
